One Day Classes

010 Flashover Recognition & Survival

FC40000 (with prop & live fire)

This 8 hour course is designed to train firefighters to recognize the signs, and to escape an impending Flashover. A flashover situation is a very serious life threatening event that could result in injury and/or loss of life to firefighters who encounter this dynamic fire situation. Students will be taught how to read smoke, utilize thermal imaging devices, as well as basic instincts to detect and escape a Flashover. This course is a mixture of classroom/lecture, as well as hands-on training utilizing a live-fire Flashover Recognition training prop.

Prerequisite: Completion of NFPA 1403 required components prior to enrolling; Live Fire Course Competency Form is required.

030 Kentucky Wildland- Awareness

FC30000

This course is the Fire Commission's mandatory 4-hour introduction to Wildland Firefighting. This course covers the minimum training required for certification as a firefighter in Kentucky. This course will consist of classroom/lecture only.

040 Swift Water Awareness

Q0005

This class teaches all the knowledge and skills required to perform at the awareness level which is designed for responders to acquire the skills necessary to recognize and support a swift water incident. It also provides an overview of specific rescue situations and precautions that responders should utilize on scene of a swift water incident.

050 CPR/AED**P0001**

In this course, students will learn how to recognize a life-threatening emergency, how to provide basic life support, the proper use of an AED and what to do in case of an airway obstruction or choking.

060 Basic Firefighting I**D0000 (3 hrs.) F0000 (1 hr.)**

This course will cover four of the recommended twenty hours of training for new firefighters and enhance the knowledge of the veteran firefighter. It will consist of one hour of Personal Protective Equipment and three hours of Fire Behavior.

Equipment needed: Full turnout gear, including SCBA.

070 Grant Writing 101**I10000**

Budget constraints are tough on many Fire Departments in today's society. In this course, students will learn about and discuss the different Grant avenues that are available for your agency. The instructor will also discuss key points that will help increase the chance of your grant being successful.

100 EMT Con-Ed II**P0010 (4 hrs.) P0008 (2 hrs.) P0012 (1 hr.) P0013 (1 hr.)**

Topics covered on this day will include 4 hours of Medical, 2 hours of Airway, and 1 hour each of OB/GYN & Pediatrics.

105 Basic Firefighting II**F0000 (2 hrs.) G0000 (3 hrs.) J0000 (3 hr.)**

This course will cover eight of the recommended twenty hours of training for new firefighters and enhance the knowledge of the veteran firefighter. It will consist of 2 hours of Personal Protective Equipment, 3 hours of Forcible Entry and 3 hours of Ladders.

Equipment needed: Full turnout gear, including SCBA.

110 Firefighter Survival**FC10000**

This course will demonstrate different techniques a firefighter can use when the primary escape route becomes blocked or if caught in a rapidly deteriorating situation. Techniques will emphasize self-rescue using tools regularly carried by or available to the firefighter.

Equipment Needed: Full turnout gear

115 Hard to Get I**W0000 (3 hrs.) C0000 (2 hrs.) X0000 (3 hrs.)**

This course is designed to assist the firefighter that is almost certified but lacks just a few hours that are "hard-to-get". It will consist of 3 hours of Aircraft, 2 hours of Communications & 3 hours of Emergency/Disaster Planning.

120 Bobtail 100 LPG LIVE FIRE**M0004**

This is a LIVE-FIRE, HANDS-ON course that helps the firefighter make informed decisions concerning propane emergencies. The Bobtail Propane Prop & the Residential Prop will be utilized.

Equipment Needed: Full turnout gear and SCBA and spare cylinder. All turnout gear must be NFPA compliant with no component older than 10 years. Students will not be allowed to participate if the instructor(s) find that the gear is not NFPA compliant or otherwise poses a hazard.

Prerequisite: Completion of NFPA 1403 required components prior to enrolling; Live Fire Course Competency Form is required. OSHA 1910.134 (No Facial Hair impeding the seal of the facepiece)

Instructors: State Fire Rescue Training District 13

125 Vehicle Extrication**Q0001**

This course is designed to educate the rescuer on the proper techniques of vehicle extrication. Topics covered will include safety, scene size-up & preparation, stabilization, new car designs & features, as well as various types of patient extrication techniques. This will be a strictly hands-on course where students will learn and practice the most up-to-date techniques for patient disentanglement, dashboard displacement, incident management & scene safety.

Equipment Needed: Helmet, eye protection, extrication jumpsuit/turnout gear, gloves & boots.

130 Legal Consideration for Fire Departments**AA0000**

This course will cover the legalities of the Fire Service. In this course, topics such as fire scene control, boundaries and liabilities, and new fire laws changing in today's world. There will be reference to KRS 75, KRS 273 CVFD, & KRS 95. There will be personal stories from Fire Chiefs who have served prison time, and coverage in Firefighter gun rights and KY child protection laws. A round table discussion for legal questions and answers will also take place.

135 The Art of Reading Smoke**D0000**

Today's structure fires are more dangerous than ever before. Lightweight construction, low-mass synthetics, and open space floorplans have created a perfect storm for rapid, prolific fire growth and extreme behavior. It is imperative for firefighters of all ranks and experience levels to be prepared for this new battle. The Art of Reading Smoke provides the knowledge necessary for first-arriving firefighters, officers, and chief officers to determine the fire's location, progression, and future "from the seat" before seeing any flame. This knowledge ensures that the correct tactics are implemented for the best possible outcome.

140 Firefighter Rescue**FC20000**

This course will concentrate on safely removing a trapped or unconscious firefighter from a burning structure. Students will review OSHA requirements for "2 in – 2 out" and discuss how to set up a rapid intervention team. *This course and course 105 FF Survival meet the requirements for FRS 2052 in the KCTCS Fire/Rescue Science Technology AAS Degree Program.*

Equipment Needed: Full turnout gear, including SCBA.

145 EMT Con-Ed IV**P0009 (3 hrs.) P0011 (4 hrs.) P0000 (1 hr.)**

Topics covered on this day will include 3 hours of Patient Assessment, 4 hours of Trauma, and 1 hour of an elective.

Lead Instructor: PHI Aeromedical

150 Hard to Get II**Y0000 (3 hrs.) S0000 (3 hrs.) and I0000 (2 hrs.)**

This course is designed to assist the firefighter that is almost certified but lacks just a few hours that are "hard-to-get". It will consist of 3 hours of Cause & Origin/Fire Investigation, 3 hours of Fire Protection Systems (Alarms and Sprinklers) & 2 hours of Ropes-Basic.

155 Basic Firefighting III

B0000 (2 hrs.) K0000 (3 hrs.) N0000 (3 hrs.)

This course will cover eight of the recommended twenty hours of training for new firefighters and enhance the knowledge of the veteran firefighter. It will consist of 2 hours of Safety, 3 hours of Fire Hose Nozzles & Appliances and 3 hours of Loss Control (Salvage & Overhaul).

Equipment needed: Full turnout gear, including SCBA.

160 Structural Firefighting LIVE FIRE (Fireblast)

M0001

Fire Control, Fire Behavior, as well as Hose Handling Techniques for Structure Fires with hands on Fireblast prop. This LIVE FIRE Course will instruct students for at grade fires, below grade fires, as well as above grade fires. This will also cover ventilation for horizontal methods, as well as vertical. This is an all-day, hands-on course for the beginner and/or experienced firefighter who wishes to enhance their skills for routine, as well as some non-routine calls involving live fire. Structural Firefighting will require Live Fire Competency Forms from the student's perspective agency. No one under 18 years of age will be permitted to attend.

Equipment Needed: Full turnout gear and SCBA and spare cylinder. All turnout gear must be NFPA compliant with no component older than 10 years. Students will not be allowed to participate if the instructor(s) find that the gear is not NFPA compliant or otherwise poses a hazard.

Prerequisite: Completion of NFPA 1403 required components prior to enrolling; Live Fire Course Competency Form is required. OSHA 1910.134 (No Facial Hair impeding the seal of the facepiece) will be enforced by SFRT Instructors for anyone participating in the live burn.

165 Low Angle Rescue

Q0007

Many rescues can be managed using basic rope skills and with a minimum of equipment. NFPA 1670 defines "Low Angle" as "an environment in which the load is predominantly supported by itself and not the rope rescue system (e.g., flat land or mild sloping surface)." This course doesn't diminish the need for additional training but provides working knowledge and skills greater than "Awareness" level. This training does not include setting up full "Operations Level" high-angle rescue systems.

Equipment Needed: Student must furnish helmet with retention and suspension system meeting NFPA, UIAA, or NIOSH safety standards, clean leather gloves, and boots that provide adequate ankle support. Personal/agency harness and hardware are welcome pending inspection and approval of instructors.

Prerequisite: A firefighter's basic knowledge of ropes, knots and hitches is needed prior to arrival at class.

170 Grain Bin Rescue**Q0006**

This course is designed to help the firefighter/rescuer understand responding to farm emergencies. This course is designed to familiarize firefighters with special techniques required to successfully coordinate and execute an agricultural rescue. Topics are:

- Rural vs. urban farm accidents
- Common types of farm accidents and special challenges
- Understanding farm equipment mechanics
- Special situations when responding
- Management of farm related incidents
- Extrication and disentanglement techniques

Equipment Needed: Safety glasses or goggles, Structural or rescue protective clothing with hand and foot protection.

Prerequisites: This is a physically challenging course.

Two Day Classes**200 Pumping like it's 2023****Z0000**

Pumping like it's 2023 will cover up to date techniques and tools of the trade for pumping firetrucks in today's climate. This will cover topics such as PSI vs. GPM, Electronic Pump Controls, Mid Ship Pumps, Drafting, Static vs. Pressure, Pumping from a hydrant, Pumping to an Aerial and/or Master Stream Device, as well as many other topics related to pumping. This course is designed to bring firefighters up to date on new technologies for firetrucks. Students will leave this course with a clear understanding of various issues that could arise when pumping on the fireground, as well as ways to mitigate those issues to ensure success.

210 Incident Safety Officer (NFA)**AA0000**

This 2-day course examines the Safety Officer's role at emergency responses. A specific focus on operations within an Incident Command System (ICS) as a Safety Officer is a main theme. Response to all-hazard types of situations will be emphasized.
